Oakland and San Francisco, CA—March 22, 2012. The Mills College Art Museum and 70 South Park announce *Femmescapes*, an exhibition showcasing work from the collection of Lenore Pereira and Rich Niles curated by students in the Mills College Museum Studies Workshop.

Lenore Pereira and Rich Niles, Bay Area collectors of artwork by contemporary women artists, have generously invited the students of the Mills Museum Studies Workshop to curate an exhibition from their collection. The all female group of students were given a unique opportunity to explore the work of an international roster of women artists. The first resulting show, *Femmescapes*, explores the relationship of a woman's place in the environment, woman as environment, and the environment as woman.

The imagery of women's bodies has historically had references to the earth and the language used to describe the female form is often identical to that used to describe agricultural land: lush, fertile, fecund, barren, etc. The work featured in *Femmescapes* explores these ideas as well as the ambiguity between the body as a metaphor for land and as an actual landscape in itself. When examined closely, body parts lose their context and appear as landscapes themselves--lips as rolling hills, navels as dimpled plains. *Femmescapes* also looks at the ways in which women control or alter their environment and how land becomes a canvas for female artists.

Featuring approximately 40 works, including painting, video, photography, sculpture, and works on paper, *Femmescapes* presents work by Louise Bourgeois, Andrea Bowers, Jeanne Dunning, Ann Hamilton, Mary Daniel Hobson, Nina Katchadourian, Lisa Kokin, Lynda Lester-Slack, Ann Mandelbaum, Ana Mendieta, Marilyn Minter, Shirin Neshat, Chikako Okada, Marlo Pascual, Amalia Pica, Liza Ryan, Kiki Seror, Kiki Smith, Oriane Stender, Sarah Sze, Nicola Tyson, Sue Williams, and Francesca Woodman.

The Mills College Museum Studies Workshop is taught by Dr. Stephanie Hanor, Director of the Mills College Art Museum, and encompasses both the theoretical and practical study of curatorial practices.
